Pastoral Spiritual Examination

When answering the call to ministry, it's been said that those called should not enter this sacred commitment without prayer, counsel, and spiritual examination. It involves commitment to serve in ways which are challenging and rewarding. To receive validation that the call by the Infinite Intelligence is genuine, the first action in many cases is prayer: to pray that this feeling or spiritual push has been graced by the Infinite.

In your own decision to answer the call to ministry, you may have sought

counsel. As a minister of any church, having the compassion and knowledge of those who walk through our doors is vital. Seeking counsel from those who may know us best is comforting and another form of validation that the spiritual path laid before us is indeed correct.

How does one entering ministry seek spiritual examination? Morris Pratt provides the knowledge needed to be an effective teacher and representative of Spiritualism. This insures proper representation of the religion, philosophy, and science for new people entering our churches.

In sharing my concerns with seminarians of various faith traditions, I found that we all shared similarities when it came to spiritual examination. In various denominations, the instruction for psycho-social training wasn't as extensive as what we had wanted. How do we as ministers become effective with those who seek our help without the psychological knowledge of self? When someone comes to you as a minister, who are they to you?

Seminarians of other faith traditions are required to have a unit (an internship) of CPE (Clinical Pastoral Education) before receiving their credentials. CPE prepares people in spiritual examination of self and others. Clinical pastoral education is education to teach pastoral care to clergy and others. Pastoral care is a practice that meets the needs of personal, social (well-being), and academic needs. To complete an internship or residency gives the minister the tools needed to strengthen the spiritual health of

those who seek our expertise during times of spiritual distress.

CPE is an interfaith method of theological education which teaches pastoral skills within a context of responsible relationships with people. It provides continuing education for minsters which may increase awareness of theological and psycho-social concerns for those in crisis. CPE provides personal growth through awareness and self-refection that is not taught in various faith seminaries.

When answering the call to ministry, spiritual examination is vital in providing sound spiritual care for those who seek our help. World Congress of Spiritualists 2018 Conference

An international conference of Spiritualists will convene on July 5-7, 2018 at the Arthur Findlay College, Stansted, England for the purpose of education, inspiration, and discussion centered on the philosophy of Spiritualism. Spiritualists from around the globe will be attending, as well as representatives from The International Federation of Spiritualists (ISF), the Spiritualists' National Union (SNU), the Spiritualist Church of Canada (SCC) and the National Spiritualist Association of Churches (NSAC). The President of NSAC, the Reverend Christine Krithades, will be a keynote speaker at the Congress. The last World Congress was held five years ago in Lily Dale, New York.

The mission of the World Congress is to unite Spiritualists worldwide around our common principles and join together to move Spiritualism into the 21st Century. The goal is to revitalize the common bonds between all Spiritualists by creating a harmonious forum for learning and discussion. We will strengthen our knowledge through educational seminars and sharing. The Congress will pro-

vide an opportunity to share experiences and common concerns and challenges with other delegates, network, renew friendships, and make new ones.

All Spiritualists are invited to attend the Congress. You can attend through a residential package for 3 nights starting at 510 British pounds, which includes all meals and overnight accommodation, as well as a guaranteed seat at the World Congress.
